Wireless Internet access is available in guest tents and throughout the resort.

Looking out over Amanwana Bay towards Medang Island and the mountains of Sumbawa, the Restaurant is located in an open-air pavilion with a lofty 15-metre

bamboo roof. Indonesian hardwood flooring and solid coconut pillars support the tropical structure, which offers alfresco and undercover dining, a teak-top bar and a lounging area. Open throughout the day and ideally positioned for sunset drinks, the Restaurant serves fresh and simple local and international dishes, with seafood a speciality. Romantic campfire dinners on the beach and starlight dinner cruises can be arranged.

Amanwana's open-air Jungle Cove Spa is set just back from the beach beneath a grove of tamarind trees. The three treatment areas overlook Amanwana Bay and the jungle, all with outdoor bathtubs. Amanwana guests can also enjoy massages, facials and body treatments with Aman's all-natural skincare products in the dedicated Spa Tent, or in the comfort of their own guest tents.

Opportunities for relaxation and activity abound at Amanwana, both on land and sea.
