A wilderness location and a sensitive connection to Rajasthan's history and culture await guests at Aman-i-Khás, an outpost on the threshold of Ranthambore National Park inspired by lavish Mughal hunting parties of old. Each of the ten soaring guest tents is beautifully furnished and assigned a personal butler. In between daily Jeep safaris to catch a glimpse of tigers and other wildlife, guests can enjoy rejuvenating spa treatments or a dip in the traditional stepwell pool, before drinks around a communal firepit and dinners lit by flickering candles under a canopy of stars.

Location

- Aman-i-Khás lies in the Aravalli Hills on the fringes of Ranthambore National Park, in rural Rajasthan

Getting There

- International flights arrive at New Delhi International Airport (DEL). From here, guests can travel four-six hours by train with Aman butler service to Sawai Madhopur, followed by a 20-minute car journey to Aman-i-Khás.
- Alternatively guests can take a one-hour flight from Delhi to Jaipur, followed by a three-hour drive to the property.

Climate

- Average temperatures between October and April peak at 30°C with overnight lows of 2°C in December and January.
- May and June are summer season, with peak temperatures reaching 40°C. July, August and September is monsoon season, with sunshine punctuated by heavy downpours and temperatures hovering around 35°C both day and night.

Aman-i-Khás remains closed between June - September



Accommodation

Set in a sun-dappled landscape, the camp's expansive tents overlook a ruggedly beautiful landscape that is home to abundant wildlife. Positioned to ensure utmost privacy, the tents offer airy living, sleeping and bathing spaces, divided, Mughal-style, by white cotton drapes.

Tented Pavilion

- 108 square metres with solid floors, hardwood and canvas walls and a sun deck.
- King size or twin beds, large daybed, leather drinks chest.
- Twin writing desks, dining area, dressing area and living area.
- Bathing area with shower, stone soaking tub and separate WC.
- Air conditioning, ceiling fan, heating.

Tented Pool Pavilion

- Offers a generous 164 square metres of space.
- Soaring bedroom, relaxing daybed and dining area.
- Bathroom with a free-standing bathtub and walk-in shower.
- Outdoor private sun deck with a three-by-three metre (10-by-10 foot) plunge pool.



Grand Tented Pool Pavilion

- 256 square metres with a temperature-controlled outdoor pool and an enclosed open-air deck.
- Sunken living area, dining space and expansive bedroom.
- King size or twin beds, large daybed.
- Bathroom with a corner bathtub and walk-in wardrobe.
- Air conditioning, ceiling fan, heating.



Dining

Dining Tent

- Softly lit and furnished with one large central table and several smaller tables.
- Indian cuisine and a range of Western dishes are served, with most of the vegetables and herbs grown in the camp's organic garden.

Firepit

- A cosy spot to congregate for evening drinks and engaging conversation.



Other Facilities

Lounge Tent

- Furnished with banquettes, reading tables and chairs.
- Wide selection of coffee-table books, novels, magazines and board games.
- A small range of local handicrafts, fabrics and sundries are available for purchase.

Stepwell Pool

- Modelled on the ancient stepwells traditional to the area.
- Surrounded by a sunny terrace with loungers, sheltered by a grove of trees.

Heated Spa Tent

- Two treatment areas, each with twin massage tables, surrounding a small fountain.
- Treatments include traditional Ayurvedic journeys, various massages, scrubs, wraps, baths and mindfulness sessions.



Activities & Excursions

Wildlife Safaris

- Venture into Ranthambore National Park with an expert wildlife guide. Once the hunting ground of the Maharaja of Jaipur, the Park has been a wildlife sanctuary since 1955 and is one of the best places in the world to see tigers in the wild.

Banas Riverbed Experience

- Two hours' away by open-top Jeep, the Banas riverbed becomes a birdwatcher's paradise during the dry season.
- Guests can enjoy a half-day excursion, strolling the banks with a naturalist.
- Lunch is served picnic-style in a peaceful spot.

Ancient Forts

- Situated within the National Park, Ranthambore Fort is one of the oldest in India and a UNESCO World Heritage Site.
- Khandar Fort, a short drive away, is perched on a hill 300 metres above the plains, where a millennium of history is on display in the ruins of its palaces.
- Explore these fascinating sites with a personal guide, then enjoy a picnic lunch in a secluded setting.

Chambal River Cruise

- A leisurely upstream cruise with a naturalist guide brings guests face to face with a variety of birds, water turtles and possibly even the elusive gharial (a thin-snouted crocodile on the Critically Endangered list).
- End the cruise at a wonderful look-out point where lunch awaits.
