Mount Agung provides a dramatic backdrop for Amankila, a secluded seaside resort overlooking the Lombok Strait in East Bali. Its 31 free-standing pavilions and villas offer exceptional sea views and are connected by elevated walkways to the resort's restaurants and signature three-tier pool. The Beach Club is set back from the private beach.

Mount Agung provides a dramatic backdrop for Amankila (peaceful hill), a secluded seaside resort on Bali's eastern shores. The 31 spacious stilted pavilions and villas offer exceptional views of the Lombok Strait from their hillside locations amongst frangipani and bougainvillea, and are connected to the resort's facilities by elevated walkways. Guests can relax around the signature three-tier pool or at the Beach Club on Amankila's beach. The resort is ideally placed for exploring local craft villages, the verdant countryside and the region's royal ruins.

Mount Agung provides a dramatic backdrop for Amankila (peaceful hill), a secluded seaside resort overlooking the Lombok Strait in East Bali. The 31 free-standing pavilions and villas offer exceptional sea views from their hillside settings, and are connected to the resort's restaurants and other facilities by elevated walkways. Guests can relax around the signature three-tier swimming pool or at the Beach Club. This offers another swimming pool and a restaurant set back from the private beach in a tranquil coconut grove. Situated in Karangasem, one of Bali's most traditional regencies, Amankila is ideally placed for exploring local craft villages, the verdant countryside and the region's royal ruins.

Mount Agung provides a dramatic backdrop for Amankila (peaceful hill), a secluded cliff-side beach resort overlooking the Lombok Strait in East Bali. Situated in Karangasem, Bali's most traditional regency just 90 minutes by car from Denpasar Airport, the resort offers 31 stilted pavilions and villas with spectacular ocean views. Amankila's freestanding pavilions subtly reflect their East Bali surroundings with particular reference to nearby Taman Soekasada Ujung, the Royal Water Palace. Nine pavilions and three villas, including the Kilasari, Indrakila, the Amankila Two-Bedroom Villa, feature private swimming pools. All are connected by elevated walkways to the resort's entrance and restaurant areas. Sandikala is located above the resort's signature three-tier swimming pool overlooking the ocean, and serves both Western and Indonesian cuisines. Adjacent is Amankila's Terrace Bar, also offering views out to sea. Arva, set back from the main swimming pool, is a celebration of authentic Italian flavors, ingenuity, and creativity. A simple menu of salads and pizzas is available at the Beach Club. Located below the resort, the Beach Club is set back from the beach in a peaceful coconut grove. Surrounded by coconut palms and partially shaded by a frangipani tree is Amankila's largest swimming pool, overlooked by the Beach Club terrace restaurant. Eight secluded lounging bales line the beach. Amankila's additional facilities include the Fitness Pavilion and the Massage Pavilion. Yoga classes can be taken in the coconut grove or in-pavilion. The Library overlooks the top tier of Amankila's main swimming pool, while the Boutique and Gallery showcase Balinese art, crafts and antiques. Amankila offers a range of activities including watersports, cooking classes, snorkelling excursions and sunset cruises. Guests keen to explore farther afield can enjoy guided treks and cycling tours, or visit local craft villages.

Mount Agung provides a dramatic backdrop for Amankila (peaceful hill), a secluded cliff-side beach resort overlooking the Lombok Strait in East Bali. Situated in Karangasem, Bali's most traditional regency, just 90 minutes by car from Denpasar Airport, the resort offers 31 stilted pavilions and villas positioned on the hillside to take advantage of spectacular ocean views. Amankila's freestanding pavilions, all with alang alang roof thatching and surrounded by frangipani trees, are designed as beach houses with a twist. They subtly reflect their East Bali surroundings with particular reference to nearby Taman Soekasada Ujung, the Royal Water Palace just outside Amlapura, the district capital. Each pavilion features a large bedroom with picture windows, a spacious ensuite bathroom and an expansive terrace. Nine pavilions and three villas, including the Kilasari, Indrakila and Amankila Two-Bedroom Villa, have private swimming pools. The Kilasari Pool Villa, which takes its name from the picturesque temple on the property, is perched high on the hillside with spectacular sea views. The Indrakila Pool Villa, named after the green hill upon which Amankila resides, enjoys privileged sea views up the east coast. The Amankila Two-Bedroom Villa provides a butler service and two separate bedrooms opening onto a large terrace with beautiful views of Amuk Bay. All pavilions are connected to the resort's entrance and restaurant areas by elevated walkways.

Sandikala is located above the resort's signature three-tier swimming pool overlooking the ocean, and serves both Western and Indonesian cuisines for breakfast and dinner. Adjacent is Amankila's Terrace Bar, also offering views out to sea. Arva, set back from the pool, is open for dinner, serving an authentic Italian flavors. A simple menu of salads and pizzas, along with Indonesian and light Western dishes, is served at the Beach Club. Located below the resort, the Beach Club is set back from the water's edge in a peaceful coconut grove. Surrounded by coconut palms and partially shaded by a frangipani tree is Amankila's largest swimming pool, overlooked by the Beach Club terrace restaurant. Eight secluded lounging bales are set along the beach. Amankila's other facilities include the Fitness Pavilion, which houses a range of cardiovascular and weight-training equipment, and the Massage Pavilion, where guests can enjoy traditional Balinese massages and beauty treatments. Yoga classes can be taken in the coconut grove or in-room. Overlooking the top tier of Amankila's main swimming pool, the Library is a cool sanctuary with floor-to-ceiling windows, while the Boutique and Gallery showcase Balinese art, crafts and antiques. Amankila offers guests a range of activities including watersports, cooking classes, snorkelling excursions and sunset cruises. Guests keen to explore farther afield can enjoy guided treks and cycling tours, or visit local craft villages. The region is a cultural treasure-trove and excursions to remote temples and palace ruins are also on offer. Amankila maintains one bale overlooking the Buitan Valley, Mount Agung, and the eastern shoreline ideal for sunrise breakfast, sunset cocktails, or traditional satay dinners.
